Madeline Simon, known as “Maddy” to countless children at her beloved Camp Kinderland since 1962 and “Mrs. Simon” to countless more children in the New York City school system, died peacefully after a brief illness.

Madeline was born in The Coops and, as a product of the Jewish left of the 1930’s Bronx,

sought to realize a world free of war, hatred and injustice. She was devoted to the survival of Yiddish language and culture, and led Yiddish classes for the last 25 years of her life.

Madeline’s talent for music led to her lifetime of work in music education, including directing Yiddish choruses throughout the East Coast. She taught music at several New York City elementary and high schools, including student instrumental performing and musical theater ensembles. At Kinderland, where she volunteered every summer from 1962 to 2017, she introduced music from the Holocaust, Civil Rights, Womens’ Equality, and workers’ movements throughout the world to generations of children. When she stood up to lead group singing, it was impossible to resist joining in. She will be remembered as a straight-talking, nurturing woman who loved a clever crossword puzzle or a good joke.

Madeline was preceded in death by Lester Simon, her husband of 33 years, and is survived by her four children and their spouses: Eve and Roy Rittle, Abby Simon, Daniel and Cindy Simon, and Fred Simon and Alisa Berkowitz. She also leaves devoted grandchildren Eric, Leah, Max, August, Benjamin, Isabel and Toby.
